

Werklund Centre Inspires Cultural Connection with Free Events for National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

For Immediate Release – September 9, 2025 – CALGARY – In recognition of National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, Werklund Centre invites people of all ages to participate in free art gallery tours, an Indigenous-curated market, an immersive performance art experience, and the Elders Story Project – a blending of ceremony and powerful storytelling – on Tuesday, September 30 in various venues at Werklund Centre. The day begins with an <u>Indigenous Makers Market</u> in the Jack Singer Concert Hall Lobby, curated by Authentically Indigenous, an Alberta-based organization that aims to amplify local Indigenous creativity, arts, and culture by curating markets, cultural events, and workshops. Accompanying the market is a Pow Wow Showcase taking place at noon for the lunch hour crowd.

Werklund Centre has partnered with IndigeSTEAM to showcase 22 individual artists in the +15 Galleries. The exhibition, *Etuaptmumk: The Art of Two-Eyed Seeing in STEAM*, celebrates the ingenuity of Indigenous youth as they navigate and embrace the wisdom of walking in two worlds. Tours run every hour at 12pm, 1pm, and 2pm with pre-registration required.

Produced by Ghost River Theatre, <u>Echoes of the Land</u> is an immersive sound experience featuring the talents of drummer and vocalist Cedric Lightning, traditional drummer and knowledge keeper Skip Wolfleg, spoken word poet Alanna Bluebird, and multi-disciplinary musicians Kris Demeanor, Kenna Burima, and Tauran.

In a powerful end to the day, Werklund Centre presents the <u>Elders Story Project</u>. For 2025, the Elders of the Elders Knowledge Circle Society have chosen to expand the format to include the audience in a sacred Blackfoot naming ceremony honouring a special guest, a tea dance, and a round dance that the entire audience can participate in.

"Werklund Centre's commitment to reconciliation means we have both the responsibility and the privilege to hold space for truth-telling, culture- and knowledge-sharing, and hosting Indigenous-led events," says Alex Sarian, President and CEO. "This is our third year hosting a full day of free events and activities on National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, and the power of these events to inspire, educate, and elicit change is truly incredible."
